## **STRAWBERRIES**

 A reminder that you should not have any stocks of Benevia 10 OD left on farm as any unopened packs should have been returned to distributors by the end of August.

#### RASPBERRIES

Check susceptible varieties for presence of Cane Midge larvae (pictured, right). Fungicides for cane diseases will give some control of the Cane Blight associated with midge damage but badly affected canes are best cut out. Keeping tunnels skinned post-harvest will lengthen the period when canes may be susceptible to Cane Blight. The AHDB Factsheet on raspberry diseases can be downloaded here.



 A further reminder that you must return to distributors any unopened packs of Exirel 10 SE by the end of November.

#### **BLACKCURRANTS**

• The end of this month is the optimum timing for an insecticide application to control returning aphids in the crop. Calypso would be the usual product of choice, if you have any stock left on farm. A reminder that the final use date is 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2021. Use at this timing can also control Woolly Currant Scale, but only if applied in a high enough water volume (minimum 400 l/ha), and Wetcit is added (1 litre/1000 litres). Batavia can be applied post-harvest but must be taken into the leaves to be activated and then ingested by the aphids, so is unlikely to be very effective in the autumn. Alternatively, the pyrethroid insecticides Decis Protech and Hallmark Zeon can be used but these are not IPM friendly and not very effective on blackcurrant aphids.

### **BLUEBERRIES**

Hopefully you have been managing your irrigation for the plants adequately through the heat of last week,
as they will not take very kindly to being too dry. Now that their late summer growth is coming to an end,
you should not be supplying any nitrogen in the feed solution as this may make the plants more susceptible
to winter damage.
